Application Process

<p>Required Application Materials</p> <p><u>Do not send physical copies</u>; those should be kept for your visa appointment.</p>	<p>Visit our website to find required forms. All items must be in English.</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Nomination Form signed by Home University 2. Online application and Supplemental Application for International Students 3. Financial Statement Form and proof of funding for duration of program 4. Home University Official Transcript 5. Copy of Passport 6. English Proficiency Documentation (TOEFL or IELTS results). 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Dates and Costs

Important Dates	<p>APU has a fall and spring term, with an optional summer term. Courses are offered in a variety of modes, with the general expectation that each semester students take a single, intensive 4-week 'block' course, followed by an 11-week 'session' where multiple courses are taken. In the 'block and session' format, students are more focused on fewer subjects at one time – providing more opportunity for active learning and deep understanding. Full-semester courses are available, as well as shorter 7-week 'module' classes.</p> <p>The Academic Calendar and important dates can be found in our University Catalog. Please pay close attention to course dates and duration when selecting classes. 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Cost of Attendance for Students	<p>Charges payable to APU are due at the beginning of each semester, such as tuition, fees, on campus room and board. You can view the annual cost of attendance, fall and spring semesters are combined, and utilize our cost estimate calculator. Please note the calculator does not calculate <i>every</i> possible fee, such as course fees.</p> <p>Each academic year, APU will offer one full-year tuition waiver, or two single-semester tuition waivers. These are awarded in cooperation with n2n administration. Tuition-paying students (those not receiving an exchange tuition waiver) will be responsible for paying the tuition rate based on the program enrolled: campus undergraduate, professional studies undergraduate, graduate, or doctoral.</p> <p>Fees: All students pay two mandatory student fees not included in a tuition waiver for exchange students. Students should be prepared to pay approximately \$205 in mandatory fees each semester. Some courses have fees, such as lab fees, that are separate from mandatory fees. Search courses to view fees at the link at the top of the APU home page.</p> <p>Other costs: Students pay all other costs, such as room and board (housing and food), books, transportation, personal expenses. Students who live on-campus pay room and board directly to APU; and a refundable \$400 housing deposit.</p>		

Arrival and Departure Information

When to Arrive	<p>Students can arrive to the U.S. 30 days prior to the start date listed on their I-20 (usually listed as the first day of orientation).</p> <p>Students should plan to arrive in Anchorage to attend the first day of APU orientation. Residence halls also open on the first day of orientation. If students arrive before the residence halls open, they can request an early move-in date with Residence Life.</p>
How to get to campus	<p>Nearest airport is Ted Stevens Anchorage International Airport (ANC). APU does not offer airport pickup service.</p> <p>Students can either take a cab, an Uber/Lyft, or take a city bus to campus. Cab fare is approximately \$20 from the airport to campus. A single ride on the bus is USD\$2.00.</p>
End of program	<p>Students should plan to stay until the last day of finals listed on the Academic Calendar.</p> <p>Students have 30 days in which they can stay in the U.S. after their program end date listed on their I-20 before they will be required to leave. The end date listed on your I-20 is the last day of finals for your final semester.</p>
Can I extend?	<p>Yes, for you may extend your visa for study or practical experience with approval from our office. See the visa section below.</p>

How to apply for your visa	<p>Once your application for study has been approved by APU, you will be required to apply for a visa to study in the United States. The steps and sequence for your application may vary by country and consulate. Visa Extensions	<p>Students can extend their visa for another semester of study or an Academic Training opportunity (employment, internship, research, or other practical experience related to your field of study). Students can extend their visa for another semester of study and are eligible to apply for Occupational Practical Training through SEVIS. Program Extension Requests must be submitted to the Dean of Students Office a month prior to your program end date.</p>
Insurance	<p>APU students have access to the ANTHC Walk In Clinic for primary health care needs, but APU requires all students to have their own health insurance plan in order to attend classes.</p>

On Campus Housing through Student Life & Activities	<p>Website: https://www.alaskapacific.edu/campus-life/</p> <p>Visiting students are encouraged to live on-campus for their studies at APU. APU offers several Residence Halls for on-campus living. Undergraduate students living on-campus will likely need to purchase a meal plan.</p> <p>Students pay a \$400 deposit upon submission of their residence hall application.</p>

Course Information

Language of Instruction	<p>All courses are conducted in English, unless it is a foreign language course.</p>
Minimum Language Requirements	<p>Students must have a certain level of proficiency in English to be able to take courses.</p> <p>To take APU classes, students must have a minimum 79 on the TOEFL iBT (79 on internet-based exam, 213 on computer-based, or 550 on paper-based) or an academic band score of 6.5 on the International English Language Test System (IELTS). APU does not offer English intensive language courses.</p> <p>If your university uses a different proficiency scale, please let us know.</p>
Minimum Credits	<p>Undergraduate: 12 <u>in-person</u> credits per semester Graduate: 6 <u>in-person</u> credits at the 400- and 600-level per semester</p>
Restricted Courses	<p>All of the following courses for credit <u>do not count</u> towards the in-person requirement:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Distance Courses; Courses that meet at a specific time but are held over Audio or Video Conference are considered distance. • Research/Thesis • Directed/Independent Study • Senior Project • Private Lessons • Internship <p>There may be additional courses that do not count towards the in-person requirement that are not listed above.</p>

Internships and Research	<p>Internship, Research, and Thesis courses are unique opportunities that must be arranged in advance of registration. These are not pre-arranged opportunities; the student and faculty must design the course requirements together.</p> <p>It is recommended that students interested in these types of opportunities plan to stay for a full year and make arrangements for these activities in the second semester.</p>
Course Information	<p>View Course Descriptions*</p> <p><i>*Courses listed in the Catalog may not always be offered during the semester as predicted.</i></p> <p>Once students have fulfilled their 12 in-person credit requirement they can search additional APU distance courses.</p>

Available Areas of Study

Selecting a Field of Study	<p>Program Objective Requirement</p> <p>At the time of application, students are required to select a “Program Objective” (major/field of study) that they wish to study at APU. The program objective can be related to their home degree, or it can be entirely different.</p> <p>Students must choose their program objective wisely, as courses taken during each semester of attendance must relate to this program objective. 75% of the student’s required credits must be related to the program objective to be approved. Courses <u>required</u> for the student’s home university degree completion may also be counted towards Program Objective requirement.</p> <p>An example regarding course selection related to a program objective: A student chooses ‘Wildlife Biology & Conservation’; related classes could include a GIS course (GEOS), Statistics (STAT), or any other course that could be argued to be related to the program objective, even if it is not WLF.</p>
